(Government Force)


We create a creature of force to protect us, but that creature has the power to destroy us. The Constitution is the **Iron Cage**.

Iron vs. Rubber




The 'Rubber Bar' Theory:

bypass mechanism.


If the bars **stretch** when the

THE MORAL REALITY



“A written constitution is in every instance a limitation upon tpon the powers of government in the hands of agents.”
— Thomas M. Cooley



The Constitution grants no rights; it limits the government.
Technology changes; human nature does not.

The Cage is Fixed.



- **Meaning** was fixed at adoption.
- **No evolution.** No modernization without Amendment.
- **Madison's Warning:** Deviation turns the Constitution into a "scheme".

The Physics of Force

Government is the only entity legitimized to use aggressive physical violence.

The Hammer Metaphor:

Like a hammer, force has mass but no conscience.

- **The Shield:** Used to build shelter (Law).
- **The Weapon:** Used to smash windows (Predation).

The Structural Paradox:

The power to protect is structurally identical to the power to destroy. The only difference is the Cage.


THE 'RICH KID' TRUST MODEL







FIDUCIARY DUTY



The Breach. Spending assets on things not in the instructions is not ‘policy’—it is embezzlement. Jefferson: “Bind him down from mischief by the chains of the Constitution.”

TECHNICAL NOTE: MISAPPROPRIATION OF RES.
ACTIONABLE OFFENSE.

The Maryland Constitution, Article I, § 6 states with unmistakable finality:

“That all persons invested with the Legislative or Executive powers of Government are the Trustees of the Public, and, as such, accountable for their conduct Wherefore, whenever the ends of Government are perverted, and public liberty manifestly endangered, and all other means of redress are ineffectual, the People may, and of right ought, to reform the old, or establish a new Government; the doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power and oppression is absurd, slavish and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind.”




The Immutable Rules of Delegation

- ✓ **Limited Source:** Cannot grant what you do not have.
- ✓ **No Redelegation:** Congress cannot give power to Agencies.
- ✓ **No Exceeding Scope:** Agent cannot outrun instructions.
- ✓ **Express Exclusion:** Enumeration is limitation.
- ✓ **Silence is Prohibition:** If it's not written, it's forbidden.



The Bank Manager's Strict Shopping List (Clauses 1-6)

The Enumerated Text

Clause 1: Lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts, and excises.

Clause 2: Borrow money on the credit of the United States.

Clause 3: Regulate commerce with foreign nations, among the several states, and with Indian tribes.

Clause 4: Establish uniform rule of naturalization and laws on bankruptcies.

Clause 5: Coin money, regulate value, fix weights and measures.

Clause 6: Punishment of counterfeiting.

Fiduciary Limits

The Strict Construction

→ NOT A BLANK CHECK. This power exists solely to pay debts and provide for common defense. Modern interpretation distorts "General Welfare" into a license for unlimited spending, breaching the fiduciary duty.

→ KEEP TRADE REGULAR. Originally intended only to prevent state-on-state tariffs. It is not a mandate to micromanage all economic activity.



Physical Infrastructure vs. The Shadow Court (Clauses 7-10)

Building & Protecting




- ✍ Clause 7: Establish post offices and post roads.
- ✍ Clause 8: Secure limited times to authors and inventors (Copyrights/Patents).

PHYSICAL LIMITS. Clause 7 authorizes mail trucks and roads, not federal control over all communication. Clause 8 protects property; it does not authorize government-funded innovation bureaucracies.

Judging & Punishing


- ✍ Clause 9: Constitute tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court.
- ✍ Clause 10: Define and punish piracies/felonies on high seas.



THE PSEUDO-COURTS. Clause 9 is systematically abused to create Administrative Tribunals within the Executive branch. When an agency acts as legislator, prosecutor, and judge, it violates the maxim “no one should be a judge in his own cause.” This bypasses the cage of the Constitution.

The Kill Switch & The Division of the Sword (Clauses 11-16)

- ✍ Clause 11: Declare war, grant letters of marque.
- ✍ Clause 12: Raise and support armies.
- ✍ Clause 13: Provide and maintain a navy.
- ✍ Clause 13: Provide and maintain
- ✍ Clause 14: Make rules for the government of forces.
- ✍ Clause 15: Call forth the militia to execute laws, suppress insurrections, repel invasions.
- ✍ Clause 16: Organize, arm, and discipline the militia.




THE KILL SWITCH: TWO-YEAR LIMIT. Money for the Army cannot be appropriated for more than two years. This forces representatives to constantly re-evaluate the need for a standing force.

CONGRESS ALONE. Only Congress can initiate war; the President cannot do so alone.

CHECKS & BALANCES: STATE CONTROL. While Congress sets the discipline, the States appoint the officers. The "hammer" of force remains decentralized.

The Geographical Cage & The Elastic Usurpation (Clauses 17–18)

The Seat



Clause 17: Exercise exclusive legislation over such District (not exceeding ten miles square) as may become the seat of government. Authority over forts, magazines, arsenals, dockyards.



STRICTLY LIMITED GEOGRAPHY. Federal power was meant to be isolated to a small enclave (DC) and specific military installations, not expanded outward into the States.

The Catch-All

Clause 18: Make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers.

VOID IF EXPANDED

THE ELASTIC USURPATION. This is the “blank check” used to invent powers not found in the text.

*Delegata potestas non potest delegari—
delegated power cannot be further delegated.*


This clause is the primary tool used to justify the transfer of legislative authority to unelected agencies, allowing the “Creature” to escape its cage.



The Cage


Methods of Escape

- *Fear and Crisis
- *Emergency Doctrine
- *Complexity
- *Compassion



The creature does not break the cage openly. It doesn't roar or kick the door down and declare itself a tyrant; instead, it probes the cage looking for weaknesses, using persuasion to convince the Settlers to look away while it slips the bars.


The Spending Abuse



**The Stretch: Turning a restriction on tax power into an independent power to spend.
Result: Legal Plunder. Buying consent with your own money.**

The Seat of Government & The “Elastic” Clause

18. To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers;



The Trap: “Necessary and Proper” (Clause 18)

- Correction: It is a utility belt for the previous 17 powers, not a blank check for new ones.


Designed to Keep Trade “Regular”

To Regulate (v): To make regular; to standardize.

Analogy: Like a clockmaker regulating a clock to ensure consistency, not a commander issuing orders.

The Commerce Clause (Article I, Section 8, Clause 3) was a relational tool. Its sole purpose was to prevent state-on-state tariffs and stop states from engaging in economic warfare against one another.

**Original Intent was strictly limited.
It governed the road, not the cargo.**



The Wheat Case: Wickard v. Filburn (1942)

The Scenario: Roscoe Filburn grew wheat for his own family. It never left his farm.


The Logic: The Court ruled that by NOT buying wheat, he reduced national demand. Therefore, his inactivity “affected” interstate commerce.

The Verdict: If the government can regulate you based on what you DON'T buy, the floor of the cage is gone. Total Jurisdiction.




The Myth of the Self-Enforcing Cage

Power that isn't tied down will eventually destroy the person who delegated it.



"Knowledge will forever govern ignorance: And a people who mean to be their own Governors, must arm themselves with the power which knowledge gives." — James Madison

MADISON'S WEAPON: THE POWER OF THE PURSE



Article I, Sec. 9, Cl. 7: No money shall be drawn but in consequence of appropriations made by Law.

The Check: Appropriations can only fund the Enumerated Powers.

STARVE THE CREATURE IF IT STRAYS.





The Challenge

Ask yourself: Where in this document did We the People grant the power to regulate the lives, liberties, or properties of the people? Where is the clause delegating control over your health choices? Your business operations? Your data? Your land use? Where is the appropriation clause allowing funds for programs not tied to the enumerated powers?

If you can't find it, and you won't because it isn't there, then the act is not law. It is usurpation.


THE ASSIGNMENT

To train your brain to see the "matrix" of government and move from the weather to the physics, you must complete this mechanical inspection of the foundation. This exercise shifts you from arguing about whether a policy is a "good idea" to the only foundational question that matters: **Is it authorized?**

- **Review:** Open the provided copy of the Constitution and read Article I, Section 8.
- **Select:** Choose one specific enumerated power from the list, such as the power to "establish Post Offices".
- **Apply Strict Construction:** Write one paragraph identifying exactly what is delegated and, more importantly, what is omitted (*casus omissus*).
- **Inspect:** Identify a modern federal agency or law related to your chosen power. Does it stay within the iron bars of the strict delegation, or has it used a "rubber bar" stretch to exceed it?
- **The Rule:** There is no arguing politics, compassion, or "necessity" here. This is a mechanical audit of the blueprint. No emotion. No outcomes.

Just the text versus the act. This is how you stop screaming at the rain and start looking at the machine.

The Founders knew human behavior. They knew we tolerate chains until the weight becomes unbearable.


